



Born in New Mexico of Indio-Mexican descent, Jimmy Santiago Baca was raised first by his grandmother and later sent to an orphanage. A runaway at age thirteen, it was after Baca was sentenced to five years in a maximum security prison that he began to turn his life around: he learned to read and write and unearthed a voracious passion for poetry. Instead of becoming a hardened criminal, he emerged from prison a writer. Baca is the author of numerous books, including What's Happening (1982), Martín, and Meditations on the South Valley (1987), Working in the Dark: Reflections of a Poet of the Barrio (1992), Healing Earthquakes: A Love Story in Poems (2001), and Breaking Bread with the Darkness (The Esaí Poems 2011, and The Lucía Poems 2012). His awards include the Luis Leal Literature Award for Distinction in Chicano/Latino Literature (2010), among many others.
